On July 22, 1998 we requested, under the Freedom of Information / Act, 1 a copy of USAID grant/contract number HSH-1439-G-00-3018-00 to Children International, Kansas City, Mo. (our request was designated as TRB-016).

So far, we have received no indication whether USAID intends to produce this grant or deny it. We respectfully request an expeditious decision, so that we may exercise our right to a timely appeal in the event our request is denied.

In the meantime, we are also requesting the following materials assocaited with USAID grant/contract number HSH-1439-G-00-3018-00. We ask that you treat this as a new request, separate from TRB-016.

- All interim evaluations of the performance of this grant/contract;
- All final evaluations of the performance of this grant/contract;
- All amendments to this grant/contract;
- •MAll correspondence concerning this grant/contract;
- MAll A-133 audits of the grantee/contractor, Children [International;
- All audits of this grant/contract;
- IAll documents reflecting any investigation by the Office of Inspector General, USAID, of the performance of this

grant/contract, or of the grantee/contractor, Children International.

As you know, the Freedom of Information Act provides that if some parts of a file are exempt from release then "reasonably segregable" portions shall be provided. We are, therefore, requesting that if you determine that some portions of the requested documents are exempt, you provide us with a copy of the remainder of the document in question. We reserve our right to appeal any such decision.

The Chicago Tribune is prepared to pay reasonable costs for locating the requested files and reproducing them. However, the -Freedom of Information Act permits you to reduce or waive the fees if that "is in the public interest because furnishing the information can be considered as primarily benefiting the

public."

Because we plan to use this information in articles we are preparing for the Chicago Tribune, a daily newspaper with a paid circulation of five million copies per week, we feel this request plainly fits that category and ask you to waive any fees. If you rule otherwise, and if the fees will exceed \$50, we reserve our rights under the statute to review and inspect the records that are responsive to this request and to select those which we want copied.
